

END OF YEAR REPORT



In 2024, SUN focused on building people power and creating an alternative vision to the extractive model of capitalism and governance that siphons wealth from our communities and hands our public resources to corporations. We stepped into this work not just to resist but to reimagine—crafting a framework that speaks to what makes us whole and brings us closer to joy.

Through months of research and organizing conversations, we concluded that public land could become the foundation of a reimagined city—a city where neighbors come together to determine what they need and take the lead in building their own sustainable future. This year, we embraced that vision and worked to turn it into action.

Our systems are failing us. We are suffering. The threats ahead are manifold.

But that's not the whole story.

In the trenches of this struggle, we encountered thousands of ordinary Nashvillians doing extraordinary things. They came to us with their frustrations, hopes, dreams, and even their peace. Together, we transformed that energy into something real—something worth standing for.

We made our office a safe space, and our team became keepers of the trust our community placed in us. Staying rooted to our base

was hard work: often unappreciated, always humbling, but ultimately deeply satisfying. This year, we pushed ourselves to step out of the spotlight and back into the grassroots movement where we belong. Because what good is a win or an accolade if you can't share it with the people you love the most?

As you'll see in this report, we did the day-in, day-out work to make tangible improvements in people's lives. We got people into affordable housing. We put people to work. We built a coalition to

secure dedicated funding for transit and developed leaders to serve on boards and commissions, holding elected officials accountable to the needs of the people. These aren't just policy wins—they're building blocks of multiracial power and class solidarity.

When we created SUN, our goal was simple: to stop developers from making decisions that impact how we live our lives. Over time, that mission deepened as we grew more knowledgeable about what it means to authentically serve our communities. We've built a movement not just to address problems, but to foster trust, connection, and joy.

Given the political climate ahead, we're grateful for the deeper bonds we've built with our base and allies. It will take an unprecedented amount of trust and care to win the fights before us. But we are ready. No one is going to fix our problems except ourselves.

This report captures key moments from the year and highlights our Theory of Change model, but it doesn't encompass all of our mission-driven work or impact. 
COALITIONS We're stronger together: the fights that create lasting change take all of us. United by common interests, we stand for transformation.

Civic Engagement - Our organizers spent countless hours training community members how to phonebank, canvass, conduct one-on-ones, and build relationships.

Public Speaking - Part of our belief in fighting relentlessly is breaking through the barriers that can hold us back. For many people, especially the working class, and especially those of us from marginalized communities, using your own voice to speak your own truth can be intimidating.

DOTS HOME

Much of the equity we all fight for is actually internal...Art has a way of evoking emotion and relaying urgency where words can often come up short. We teamed up with PowerSwitch Action and A Host of People to put on our first ever theatrical play to highlight the housing crisis we are experiencing, Dot's Home.

We say "the base" when mentioning the people we organize with and for but we know these people intimately and know more than just their predicaments. We know their stories, their families, and the very thin thread that's holding them together. Dot's Home was an opportunity for us to say we see you, we understand the urgency, and thank you for trusting us to carry your truth forward.

OUR POWER BUILDING STRATEGIES COALITION



Shift Nashville

In August, we formed the SHIFT Nashville coalition with the Tennessee Immigrant and Refugee Rights Coalition and The Equity Alliance to support the transit referendum and organize our bases so this historic investment benefits working-class communities.

Together, we phonebanked, canvassed, wrote postcards, held community events, educated residents about the transit plan, and threw voting parties to get people to the polls. All of this hard work paid off with the referendum passing emphatically.

We are now beginning to organize around our <u>policy platform</u> to make sure the implementation of this **\$3 billion** infrastructure project centers community needs over corporate greed.

Our priorities include community decision-making, affordable housing at transit hubs, jobs that actually support working-class families, high-quality contracts with safe working conditions, investments in small businesses that provide service and value to the community, and infrastructure that protects our communities in the event of natural disasters.

The state of TN and the city of Nashville have one of the lowest civically engaged populations in the country. Many of the social justice barriers we are tasked with removing are anchored in the reality that our communities are not voting.

This year we committed to connecting the dots between the lack of civic engagement and the hardships we face (in their many manifestations). We held listening sessions, took residents to Metro Council Meetings, board and commission meetings, and brought Department Heads $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ task force leaders to them.



OUR POWER BUILDING STRATEGIES POLICY

Public Land

For the past eight years we have been tasked with the housing crisis. We have launched campaigns, passed historic CBA's, written legislation, and called upon national spotlights and with all this effort and gained knowledge and experience we can confidently say...housing systems across is broken!

Ever do a thing with all the best intentions and it still not be enough? That's how we feel about the historic CBA we passed in 2018. As we watch with pride Black & brown families move back into a community that has been completely transformed by gentrification, there's still a feeling of dissatisfaction.

Most of our people can't even afford the supposed affordable units that we have fought for and won. Even when they can make rent, there's the same old discrimination from property managers and paying junk fees just to apply. The problem is that developers and corporate landlords call the shots. There's no community control.

SUN spent much of 2024 holding community meetings, listening sessions, and organizing conversations with our base about this problem. We examined failed campaigns, did extensive research, and even traveled abroad to explore alternative models.

This led us to the conclusion that public land can be the foundation of a reimagined city, where our neighbors can come together to determine what they need and how to become stewards of their own sustainable future.

All this discussion, debate, and passion came together to manifest a new path forward. We created a <u>public land map and how-to</u> <u>guide</u>, articulated <u>principles</u> to guide community-controlled housing and development, and made a <u>checklist</u> for people to hold decision makers accountable.

These tools are now being used to train our base to organize their neighbors and leverage public land to meet community needs.


Nashville's Budget


The overwhelming majority of need and frustrations we heard directly from the people was the high cost of housing, the lack of affordable quality childcare, and the hours spent in traffic. What was also abundantly clear is that the majority of people experiencing these hardships had no knowledge of what to expect from the city budget and how creating better demands around it would be the most immediate and impactful way to reduce the stress in their daily lives. So we took the time to break down the complexities of the budget in a long-form series accompanied by engaging, digestible social media.

OUR IMPACT

Black, Brown, and working-class students and underpaid workers were engaged to build relationships and explore better career paths.

Good Jobs Nashville

We build pathways out of poverty so our most marginalized communities have a chance to thrive and build wealth. We run workforce programs that connect residents in need of good jobs with highroad employers and push for policies that support worker safety, fair wages, and career opportunities as part of our Good Jobs Nashville Initiative.

Our First Source Hiring Program gives people from high-poverty areas of the city priority in the hiring process for jobs at the MLS soccer stadium, as part of the community benefits agreement we won in 2018. This year we held 17 job fairs and made 90 referrals to put people to work at the stadium.

SUN's also a core partner of Music City Construction Careers (MC3) — an apprenticeship readiness program that prepares

underrepresented residents to enter 15 union apprenticeship programs in the skilled construction trades. In 2024, MC3 graduated 90 students from the community program and 18 seniors from the inaugural school-based program at Maplewood High School.

We are currently working on initiatives to help secure federal investments for equitable workforce development, expand MC3's school-based program to a second high school, incubate minority union contractors, and ensure the 60,000 jobs that will be created by the Transit Improvement Program we helped pass are good union and public sector jobs.


